

## LO'S CLASS OF 2023 PREPARES FOR THEIR BRIGHT FUTURES.

How ironic that the publication of Legal Outreach's summer, feel good newsletter, THE VERDICT, coincides with the Supreme Court's disappointing ruling on Affirmative Action. The good news, that we traditionally share at this time, is that 100% of Legal Outreach's 2023 seniors were accepted to college with 87% planning to attend schools rated as the nation's most, highly, or very competitive colleges. The bad news is that the Supreme Court has made it more difficult and challenging for juniors, our sophomores, and freshmen, overwhelming majority of whom are young people of color residing in underserved communities, to have the same range of choices that can change their educational and career trajectories. The Court's decision diminishes America's reputation as the land of opportunity, especially if education is the key to advancement. We cannot pretend that young people within our primary and secondary schools in poor and underserved communities have an equal chance to make their way to college, particularly to institutions that are highly selective. Many have overcome hardships not of their own making - hardships that stem from the enduring effects of slavery, Jim Crow, overt and discrimination, institutional racism, and implicit bias. They've made the most of what was offered. But yet, somehow, they are expected to compete on equal footing with those, who through birth or circumstance, have been provided with so much more. How can anyone, particularly our learned justices, believe that the playing field is leveled, injustices of the past have been rectified and, thus, there's no longer a need to take race and its intended or unintended consequences into account? We have not morphed into a nation where the color of one's skin is irrelevant and of


The highest court in the federal

Undoubtedly, the matriculation of our students from underserved communities to the nation's top colleges and universities has been the hallmark of our success as an organization. We are proud that this year alone, 87% of the class of 2023 will be attending selective colleges, including Yale, Princeton, U. Chicago, and many others. To maximize the post-secondary options available to them, our students have made the investment over four years, participating in thirteen different academic, professional, leadership programs; however, our approach – instilling developing skills, and providing support - is not simply about providing students access to college, but ensuring they are prepared to compete at high levels once they are admitted.

Now, more than ever, we must continue to strive to close the gap still exists in educational achievement so our students can stand sure-footed against collegiate counterparts. The reality is that until there is educational equity in our schools and equal opportunity for all students, there is still work for us to do....even more than before. We need our partners and supporters alumni, parents, law firms, corporations, law schools, students, philanthropic foundations, and all those committed to leveling the playing field in educational attainment – to join us in ramping up efforts to prepare our students at the highest levels.
